**Note:** These statements are suggestions, presented in paragraphs of ideas that fit together. The affirmative simple present verbs are <u>underlined</u>, and there are <u>two lines</u> under the negative verb phrases. There are many correct possibilities, of course, especially with additional vocabulary and/or (\*\*\*) more advanced sentence structure.

I <u>don't cook</u> every day. Once or twice a week I <u>make</u> a lot of food and <u>freeze</u> it. \*\*\*We <u>take</u> food out of the freezer daily and <u>thaw</u> and <u>cook</u> it. Now and then I <u>bake</u>. I <u>don't</u> ever <u>make</u> cookies. I usually <u>make</u> a cake or a pie. We <u>have</u> it for dessert. We <u>take</u> it with us to work. \*\*\*For breakfast we most often <u>eat</u> easy meals, like cereal with fruit and milk. I usually <u>take</u> a sandwich with me for lunch. Sometimes I <u>buy</u> a drink from a vending machine. \*\*\*We rarely <u>go</u> out to eat in a restaurant in the evening during the week, but we occasionally <u>bring</u> food home from a take-out place. More often, we <u>eat</u> our delicious, pre-prepared food. \*\*\*I <u>don't</u> usually <u>do</u> the dishes, by the way.

My roommate and I <u>clean</u> the apartment together. Once or twice a month, we <u>get</u> out all the cleaning equipment—the broom, the sponge mop, the vacuum cleaner, the sponges, the brushes, and the rags. We <u>collect</u> the cleaning products, too—the floor wax, the furniture polish, the cleanser, the ammonia, and so on. \*\*\*Something necessary <u>isn't</u> there? Then I <u>go</u> to the store and <u>buy</u> it.

\*\*\*Finally, we <u>get</u> started. We often <u>begin</u> with the laundry (the bed linens). We <u>take</u> the sheets and pillow cases off the beds. With the right amount of detergent and bleach, we <u>put</u> them in the washing machine. We <u>set</u> it to "hot" and "normal" and . . . .
